George Williams, son of Walter Williams, Tanner of Bristol, England, was baptized at St. James Church, Bristol, England.[1]</p> <p>12 Nov 1625 Bristol, Gloucestershire, England. Walter Williams died.</p> <p>05 Jun 1626 Bristol, Gloucestershire, England. Dorryty Williams [widow of Walter?] and John Panter were married at St. James Church.[2]</p> <p>03 Nov 1634 Bristol, Gloucestershire, England. "George Williams son of Walter Williams late of the City of Bristol tanner deceased bound apprentice of Richard Robinson of the same City, taylor, and Jane his wife for 7 years. Fee 4 shillings and sixpence, freedom of Bristol and double aparel."[3]</p> <p>04 Sep 1656 Bristol, Gloucestershire, England. George Williams, tailor, of Bristol left England sometime on or after 04 September 1656 for Virginia. He was indentured to Thomas Bridgman of Bristol, England, for four years.[4] "George Williams of the City of Bristol taylor bound to Thomas Bridgman of the same merchant for 4 years to serve in Virginia and to have in the end thereof one axe, one house, one years provisions, two suits of apparel and fifty acres of land, according to custom of the country."[5] An indentured "servant could not have owned land for at least four years."</p> <p>12 Mar 1657/8 Land Patent: Giles Driver, 200 acres adjacent to above, "beginning at a red oake on the Cypress Swamp being the corner of a patent of 750 acres belonging to Ambrose Bennett's heir", for transportation of four persons: Elizabeth Williams, Elizabeth Reynolds, Jno. Goodale, James Crow. [6] The identity of this Elizabeth Reynolds [and this Elizabeth Williams] is unknown. She could have been the wife of Christopher Reynolds Sr., imported perhaps as a Rivers but claimed as a Reynolds by the time the headright certificate was obtained. Presumably (for the reason given above) the importation had occurred at least three years earlier. Whether her name was Reynolds at the time of arrival, is unknowable, but it was Reynolds at the time the headright certificate was granted. Whoever she is, the probability is that Giles Driver was not the importing party but rather had purchased the rights to use the names. [See analysis of headrights elsewhere for an explanation.][7]</p> <p>NOTE: Ambrose Bennett (30 Aug 1680) and Giles Driver (6 May 1669) were associated with George Williams at later dates. A man surnamed Driver was associated with Richard Reynolds.</p> <p>Abt 1658/63 Isle of Wight Co., VA. This land later was left by George Williams to his eldest son William Williams. The land then passed to the brother of William Williams, George Williams II and the same sold it 06 April 1700 to Richard Reynolds, Jr. who had married Elizabeth Williams daughter of George Williams I.[14]

Bef 1672 Isle of Wight Co., VA. The wife of George Williams, Sr., must have predeceased him.

09 Oct 1672 Isle of Wight Co., VA. George Williams, Tailor. Leg. son William to Mr. Pharoah Cobb; son George to Mr. Henry Applewhaite; daughter Elizabeth to Mr. William Bressie and his wife Susanna, if it shall please God to send them back to Virginia. Friends: Mr. Arthur Smith, Pharoah Cobb, and Henry Applewhaite, overseers. Witnesses: Giles Limscott, Richard Lewis, Williams Siggell. Wife was not mentioned, so she must have died. The children were under age, and were assigned to other people. William Williams was the eldest child.[15] Recorded 16 Oct 1672. 13 Oct 1672 Security: Richard Sharpe, Francis Ayres.[16]

17 Oct 1677 Isle of Wight Co., VA. Henry Combes of the Upper Parish made his will. Leg.-wife Mary. Wit.: George Hardy Sr., John Coker, George Williams. Rec. 09 Apr 1678.[17]

The above George Williams could not have been George Jr., as George Jr. was under age when the 1685 record below was written. This suggests George Williams, Sr., did not die until after 1677.

ca Apr 1685 Isle of Wight Co., VA. "Richard Reynolds Jr. and wife Elizabeth and brother-in-law George Williams, orphan of George Williams, receive the estate of William Williams, decd. Pharoah Cobb to produce the will.[18] 'Estate' meant personal property, most likely livestock and household goods in this case. We know most of this information from later records, the main significance of this one being that it tells us Richard Reynolds the younger was married to Elizabeth Williams by 1685, thus explaining the following record for February 1686."

20 Dec 1685 Isle of Wight Co., VA. Ann Tullaugh, Richard Reynolds, Isabell Williams witnesses to will of John Burnell, proved 9 Dec 1685. [Isle of Wight Will & Deed Book 2, p247, abstracted by Chapman, p. 25][19] [Who is Isabell Williams?]

is evidently his wife's from her father's estate. Ten years later when Murphrey sold the land, he described it as half of a 200-acre parcel adjoining Thomas Bombridge deceased, John Askew and the Meadow Swamp. Meadow Swamp seems to be what is now called Cohoon Swamp, several miles south of Cypress Creek. An interesting connection: I can find no patent to Richard Webb, but there is a later deed by John Askew's heir, and witnessed by Murfrey's grantee, which refers to "Richard Webb's land originally taken up by Richard Staples" bordering the Meadow Swamp. The land Richard Reynolds is selling to William Murfrey is evidently quite near this land, or perhaps part of it. That raises the question of whether there was some relationship between Richard Staples and George Williams. [NOTE: There may have been more than one George Williams of similar ages.]
